

Some key needs



- Coordinate research and monitoring
- > Ensure continuity over time
- Provide a platform to develop in-country capacity (research and monitoring, management)
- ➤ Encourage filling gaps in domestic legal/policy frameworks and provide guidance on where to anchor OA
- > Rationalize / coordinate efforts/projects, especially donor-funded
- > Cooperate on OA-related interdependencies (e.g. fisheries)
- Share experiences and pool expertise
- > Support and legitimize concerned local / national stakeholders

Strategy for Climate and Disaster Resilient Development in the Pacific (SRDP)

1.2 Climate Change and Disaster Risks in the Pacific

(...) Ocean acidification will continue, with the rates of acidification proportional to the emissions scenario. The impacts of ocean acidification will be felt more strongly in the Eastern Equatorial Pacific, for example, the easternmost islands of Kiribati at the end of the 21st century under the RCP8.5 scenario (Ciais et al., 2013)v. Ocean acidification, in association with increasing sea surface temperatures, is also projected to result in an increase in the frequency and severity of coral bleaching events. (...)

1.6. Strategic Approach and Rationale

(...) New and possibly unforeseen challenges to achieving and maintaining the resilience of PICT development outcomes are likely to arise through the lifetime of this Strategy. Some will manifest relatively slowly, and may represent issues that are already apparent but not yet of major and widespread concern. This includes the use of geoengineering to combat climate change. Others will occur as relatively rapid onset events, such as the ongoing process of ocean acidification, which may have dire consequences for PICTs. Despite the inherent shortcomings in information and understanding, and the resulting uncertainties, it is important that PICTs, and their development partners, have in place procedures that facilitate early identification of these issues, as well as appropriate responses. (...)

Helps decide and design

Regional mechanisms have a mixed track record of delivering change - current international mood is not favourable

The "age of innocence" has come to an end: ever more justification will be deemed necessary for each new piece to the system
