The Climate Change Matters newsletter this month features a collection of stories from the highly successful and first ever Pacific Ministerial Meeting for Meteorology was held in Nuku'alofa last month. The outcome of which, was a Ministerial Declaration calling for urgent support to National Meteorological and Hydrological Services in the Region and their services to reach all sectors and at all levels and communities.

The Pacific Meteorological Council (PMC) play a critical role in collecting data for and disseminating early warnings and responses needed to expand to adaptation and risk reduction planning if our vulnerability were to be significantly minimised. This is where their services or technically known as climate services need to be used and consistently applied in development planning as basis for resiliency building.

In addition we have stories from two of our partners which highlights some project success in participating countries. As some of you also know this is the final year of implementation of the EU funded SPC GCCA PSIS Project, thus the final Steering Committee Meeting for the Project

will meet in Yap for the last time as they finalise implementation of the project.

You will also note there is an invitation to join the Regional Technical Support Mechanism (RTSM) which is funded by ADB through the pilot programme on climate resilience (PPCR) and provides an innovative financial facility to rapidly respond to PICTS needs which I hope you will share with your respective networks.

Latest numbers show at least 5 metres sealevel rise locked in

The 5th Planning and Steering Committee Meeting of the Secretariat of the Pacific Community's (SPC) Global Climate Change Alliance: Pacific Small Islands States (GCCA: PSIS)

Project, funded by the European Union, will bring together 65 participants from the nine smaller Pacific Island countries and development partners in Colonia, Yap State, Federated States of Micronesia, from 31st August – 2nd September 2015. The meeting will be held at The Marina, Colonia. Meeting participants will review the project's progress and discuss the remaining activities to be completed before the project's completion in November 2016. The delegates will also visit the project sites in Fais Island and Yap State.

Following this, a two-day Lessons Learnt Meeting will be held from 3-4th September 2015 to share information about the successes and challenges experienced during the project's implementation since its commencement in 2012 in the nine project countries, namely, Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Kiribati, Republic of Marshall Islands, Nauru, Niue, Palau, Tonga and Tuvalu. Identification of lessons learnt and how to share and apply them as widely as possible within the Pacific region will be a key focus.
