This issue highlights the steep level of vulnerability Pacific island countries and territories are facing and also outlines some of the country commitments to reducing their vulnerabilities. I'm sure you are with me in congratulating these countries but we all understand this is only a tiny snapshot of national priorities. These priorities need to be up scaled and replicated to all communities with similar needs.

This month, the world will gather in Sendai, Japan for the third World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction, and the Pacific will be represented by several leaders and Cabinet Ministers with their delegations.

We, as a region, have been very proactive in reviewing our commitments to the Hyogo Framework for Actions (2005-2015): Building the Resilience of Nations and Communities to Disasters through the implementation of our own regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Disaster Management Framework for Action.

The Pacific is also attending the Sendai conference where we will showcase the draft integrated strategy known as the "Strategy for Climate and Disaster Resilient Development in the Pacific (SRDP)".

We are the first region in the world to fully integrate climate change and disaster risk management in a single overarching regional strategy which focuses on resilient development.

The SAMOA Pathway committed us to durable and sustainable partnerships, and the Pacific expects to make progress on that in Sendai for the implementation of the SRDP and the new global outcomes from Sendai.
